EFFECTIVE ACTION AGAINST AGGRESSION - 1950

Whereas, it has become obvious that, in case Security Council action against aggression is prevented or delayed, the United States must find other ways to maintain or restore peace; and

Whereas, the General Assembly under Articles 11 and 14 of the Charter has ample "authority and responsibility for matters affecting international peace,"

Therefore, be it resolved, that the 18th Biennial Assembly of the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods, convened in Cleveland, Ohio, November 12-15, 1950, records its approval of the action of the Fifth General Assembly in adopting, under the general head "The United Action for Peace," the following measures: (I) that provision be made for immediate calling of an emergency session of the General Assembly, when needed, to recommend collective action against aggression; (2) that a peace observation commission be established to watch over and report on areas where aggression threatens; (3) that each member state designate certain units of its armed forces for United Nations use, and maintain them in readiness for service; and (4) that the General Assembly appoint a committee to study and report on the implementation of these measures.
